Kate Fulton

Kate led on some of the first self-directed support initiatives in the UK on projects such as New Partnerships and Dynamite, using these experiences to learn valuable lessons about real system change and empowerment. She believes that real empowerment is much more than simply moving money, but requires a radical change to the way in which we assist people to lead change across all areas of life. Kate is currently working in Western Australia supporting the transformation of human services with the introduction of the National Disability Insurance Scheme for people with a disability and people who experience mental ill health. She is also supporting initiatives that enable older people to direct their supports with the HACC SDS



Tim Keilty

Middlesbrough Council, supported by Tim Keilty from In Control Scotland, has pioneered the use of self-directed services with children in care. Initially the 'Returning Children to Middlesbrough' project aimed to return children from expensive out-of-area placements back to family in Middlesbrough; increasingly this approach is being used to prevent children leaving in the first place. Guided by a simple question 'What would it take?', this work has led to much-improved outcomes for children and families and significant savings to council budgets. Tim is also leading work in Scotland with three local authorities, where the Middlesbrough approach is working alongside other 'capacity' approaches such as Family Group Conferencing and Signs of Safety with some early success. Tools, ideas and stories will be shared on the day.
